1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Naveen Govt. College, Pamgarh Dist.-Janjgir-Champa came into existence in 2011 in the vicinity of the Giroudhpuri Dham, the birthplace of saint GuruGhasi Das. The college started with arts, science and commerce faculty in Satnaam Bhavan, Pamgarh, with the help of Ex- MLA Shri Dujram Bouddh and local representatives. It is a centre of higher learning in this remote region in the Janjgir District. In 2015, it shifted behind Tehsil office, Pamgarh and later named after Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar, maker of the Indian Constitution. It is a multi Faculty College situated in the lap of historical places. The UGC accorded its recognition under section 2 (f) on 31.03.2014.

The college is affiliated with Atal Bihari Vajpayee University, Bilaspur, and is devoted to meet the needs of the higher education in the Pamgarh region to provide a balanced, holistic education. It aims to propagate knowledge in the socially and economically challenged area to the student. It offers UG courses such as B.A., B.Com. B.Sc., with all elective subjects. It also has a PG course in English and Political science. The college has a picturesque location, well furnished and well-equipped facilities. It provides education to remote and deprived masses. The total strength of the students in the academic year 2019-20 is 692 (Out of which female = 56.5 %), which underlines the significance of our college in terms of women empowerment. It has a devoted and determined staff that is consistently engaged in student-centric activities. The college implements some of the best practices for smooth administrative and academic performance: Prizes for meritorious students, Sadbhavna rally, and many awareness programs. It also promotes Sports, Art and Culture by organizing sports and cultural activities.

Regarding social extension, the college has an N.S.S. unit of 100 students, which has been conducting constructive social activities that groom the collective aspects of our students. The college has an active women empowerment cell.

The teaching staff is qualified and constantly engaged in academic, research and social activities. With their vast experience and broad vision, the college staff supports the ambition plan that takes the college to achieve the great height.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Atal Bihari Vajpayee University, Bilaspur designs the curriculum of all the courses/subjects and prescribes it to all its affiliated colleges. The college teaches the curricula developed by the affiliating university (ABVV). The institution makes every effort to improve and update the syllabus when required by participating in BoS (Board of Studies) as organized by the university. In addition to this, an academic calendar is offered by the Department of Higher Education every year. So College prepares its academic calendar, which works with the university and Department of Higher Education. The college offers three undergraduate programs (B.A., B.Sc., B.Com) and two Postgraduate Programs (M.A . English Literature and M.A. Political Science). The Undergraduate Program follows the annual Examination system, and Postgraduate Program follows a semester system. To monitor the vision and mission of the college, various committees are working to look after the effective implementation and timely completion of the prescribed syllabus, co-curricular activities, and extension activities. The college has also introduced the feedback system. We provided a questionnaire to students, and their feedback was collected and analysed. The analysis helped improve the quality of the college and a healthy academic environment created for the empowerment of the students and institution. At present, the college has 692 students on its roll.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The data reveals that there has been a consistent increase in the number of students admitted to the first year. There are no students from other states and countries. In this college12th pass out aspiring 'to get admission in arts, science and commerce stream and UG pass out student seeking admission in M.A. Political Science and English Literature. The admission process to various Programs is transparent and fair. The college follows the reservation policy (ST-32%, SC-12%, OBC-14%, & PWD-5%) laid down by Chhattisgarh Government. In a few programs, seats remain vacant. The college is a co-educational institution, and in many of the programs, girls outnumber the boys.

Every possible measure is undertaken for a conducive classroom environment to make teaching-learning effective. This results in bifurcating and treating well the advanced learners and slow learners. Teachers are encouraged to use modern teaching aids with the conventional teaching method. Students' academic performance is gauged by internal evaluation based on marks secured by them in unit /class tests, seminars, project work, assignments, etc. The College has a separate IQAC that reviews the academic progress of every department and conducts the academic audit timely. Apart from these, the cell adopts the transparent and robust mechanism to assess the student's progression in (CIE) continuous internal evaluation in a specified schedule mentioned by the Department of Higher Education Chhattisgarh. Methods of the evaluation process, examination pattern and course outcome are communicated to students from time to time. The related examination grievances are addressed in a time-bound, transparent and effective way through the examination committee. The students discontented with the marks given can apply for revaluation and totalling. The college has developed a feedback system that keeps an eye on the teaching-learning process and students satisfaction.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The College has young faculty striving to promote a research culture. Thus it has encouraged teachers to participate in conferences workshops and publish research papers. The faculty of Hindi, Political Science, Chemistry and Zoology are recognized as research guides. Dr. D.S. Thakur (Hindi) is recently supervising three research (PhD) Scholars. Some faculty members have research papers in reputed international and national. One of the faculty contributed book chapters with international peer-reviewed publishers (Elsevier, Springer). The college has a functional NSS unit through which extension activities are carried out, such as the Swacch Bharat Abhiyan campaign, AIDS awareness, Blood Donation, Environmental awareness, People health awareness, and electoral awareness. Sports Week to create awareness and importance of Sports among the youth of this area. Providing Financial Assistance to needy students. Plantation to make campus green, Cleanliness drive, Women empowerment, Polio eradication drive. Excursion tours are organized for the students in department of Geography specially to provide to practical knowledge. Students get chance to learn Environmental issues. However, the College is newly established yet has not developed any related platform for the student so that their novel idea translates into a viable business/startup.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has its building spread over 15 acres, situated behind the Tehsil Office of Pamgarh. The college comprises of Principal chamber, 01 staff Room, 01 Office, 15 classrooms with proper seating, lighting facility, and Green board / Whiteboards, Girls common room, NSS room, cultural program stage, Sports room, Smart classroom, office of Pandit Sunder Lal Sharma University, Geography Department, separate washrooms for male and female staff as well as for girls and boys too. There are separate laboratories for Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Physics (along with darkroom) and Geography. The college has 02 LCD projectors. The College

library has more than 11,000 valuable books, including 04 newspapers (03 Hindi & 01 English). The College has an internet facility and demand for computers from administration is in the pipeline. Wi-Fi-based internet facility is one of the top priorities of the college. The entire College is under 16 close circuit cameras surveillance to enhance the security services. LED bulbs are used as a lighting source in all rooms to lower energy consumption. In addition to a regular electricity system, a 150 Ah battery-powered inverter is installed for a continuous power supply in addition to a regular electricity system. Sports are an essential component in any educational program as it adds to students' overall personality and character development. The college has a big playground in the campus and has facility for cricket, kho-kho, volleyball, Badminton, athletics, Kabaddi, chess etc. Various cultural activities and events are organized throughout the year and during the annual gathering. Students organize a welcome party and farewell party at UG and PG levels. They also celebrate Teachers Day as a mark of respect to their teachers. Keeping in mind the rich cultural values, Saraswati Pooja is celebrated by the students.

Student Support and Progression

The College has an independent support system aimed at holistic education. The various cells and committees like a parent-teacher committee, Grievance redressal cell, anti-ragging committee, competitive examination cell, career counselling cell, and Student Union council in the college to support the students' overall wellbeing. The eligible students get financial assistance in scholarships from state government-sponsored schemes. Free stationery is provided to the SC and ST Students. The college also conducts remedial/doubt removing sessions for the students. Sports is a college forte, and many students have received accolades at intercollege, state, national, and international levels. Cultural events are a part of the varied activities; thus, they are involved in, and they can perform well. The NSS wing of the college engages the students in community development activities that motivate them to apply in social services. The NSS team has conducted an awareness rally in a nearby village on Health & Hygiene, environmental conservation, tree plantation, Anti-tobacco awareness, female health issue awareness programs, and personality development. The college NSS team regularly visits the surrounding places and villages, generating awareness on various social, cultural, and ethical issues. College magazine DHAROHAR is published by the publication cell, which reflects the very idea of the teachers and students. Feedback is taken from the students, parents, and Alumni on the infrastructure and facilities. In addition, the College granted membership in various administrative bodies of the college such as the student union, Help desk committee, IQAC of the College.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Its organizational structure, management, and governance are a government institution under rules and regulations laid down by the state government. In a hierarchy, the college principal is entrusted with the proper execution of plans with the office's assistance. The Principal is assisted by Heads/coordinators of various departments, librarians, office staff, and Janbhagidari funded staff.

The college's budget allocation is made by the state government/ District Administration(sometimes)/ Janbhagidari Samiti. The Principal disburses in consultation with IQAC members to different departments/committees to purchase books, equipment, and other necessary expenditure.

The Government of Chhattisgarh does recruitment and Promotion of the administrative and academic staff. The Principal monitors teaching and non- teaching staff as per the norms set by the Department of Higher Education, which is based on CR (confidential report) /API (Academic Performance Indicator) / PBAS

(Performance-based appraisal system). GIS (Group Insurance Scheme) is mandatory for all.

The sports activity is run under the guidance of the sports –in-charge. So, in a nutshell, various committees look after college affairs. Feedback from the students is the key parameter of assessment.

The college is always striving to improve academic quality; infrastructure up-gradation with their holistic development. The college has a well-established IQAC, which actively takes part in the college's developmental decisions, including academic audit and infrastructural up-gradation. Thus IQAC convenes the meeting with different departments/stakeholders and assesses their progress.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college has adopted many new best practices and focuses on spreading environmental awareness among students and faculty to achieve a clean and green campus environment. The College is undertaking ecological awareness programs like tree plantation, No Plastic zone, regular health check-ups, and many more. Our college also organized programs like 'Gender Awareness' among all students. Redcross Society organizes Blood Donation camps. The college has the necessary eco- friendly system in terms of maintenance of sanitary pad vending machines.

National and International commemorative days, events, and festivals are celebrated in the institute. Green campus and sanitary pad maintenance are the two best practices that the institution has successfully implemented.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	1. The College embraces the vision of the National Education Policy, which is to deliver high-quality education to develop human resources in our country as global citizens. 3. Skill development:	3. The current curriculum as offered by the affiliating university and the course structure has a little scope for vocational education, vocational training and academic education which may facilitate inter-stream movement of students and vocational trainees.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	4. The college encourages students to learn Hindi as a national language by offering UG and PG programmes in the language. There are programmes available to encourage Hindi learners and help them comprehend the cultural values reflected in Hindi literature. The college has also started a diploma course in ?????? ???? (chhattisgarhi bhaasha) under value-added course to promote the regional language and cultural awareness. The curriculum of Sociology, Hindi Literature, English literature offers a wide scope to inculcate the dissemination of the Indian Knowledge system through its variety of literature such as Social stratification, the curriculum on culture and structure of Indian society.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	5. The College provides majors in science, the arts, and commerce. These programmes are available as outcomes-based education (OBE), which is created with regional and global needs in mind. With clearly specified Program Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes, and course outcomes, the College has introduced outcome-based education. Remembering, Understanding, Applying, Analyzing, Evaluating, and Creating are all cognitive talents emphasized in all of the courses. Learning outcomes at all levels include social responsibility and ethics, as well as entrepreneurial abilities so that students contribute proactively to the nation's economic, environmental, and social well-being. To implement the spirit of NEP, the affiliating university prepared all academic syllabi with careful consideration for macroeconomic and social needs at large.
6. Distance education/online education:	6. As a result of the Covid -19 pandemic, educational institutions are increasingly relying on digital channels to engage students, organize conferences, and hold meetings. The opening up of the economy, including educational institutions, has prepared the path for adopting a hybrid form of education known as "PHYGITAL," which combines online and offline resources. This can be thought of as the new normal, also envisioned in the New Education Policy. Access to online resources for instructors and students will no longer be a constraint, thanks to the experience learned during Covid-19's closing period. Faculty are encouraged to access MOOC courses available through various portals, hence encouraging a blended learning approach.

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Dr. BhimraoAmbedkar Govt. College, Pamgarh is affiliated with Atal Bihari Vajpayee University (ABVV), Bilaspur, (formerly Bilaspur University, Bilaspur C.G.) and follows the University's curriculum.

For the implementation and delivery of the curriculum, the College produces several action plans at various levels, which are as follows:

(a) Once the college office receives the University's academic curriculum and other standards, it is forwarded to the departments. After consulting with faculty members, the department carefully allocates papers, keeping in mind the interests of students and the competence of teachers.

(b) The Time Table Committee creates schedules that consider infrastructural and laboratory requirements. The timetable (class-by-class/teacher-by-teacher) authorized by the committee and the Principal is posted on the college notice board long before the semester begins for convenient access. For the sake of clarity, a room-by-room timetable is created.

(c) Departmental committees determine workload, recommend recruiting, and compile a list of practical equipment needed for the curriculum's proper implementation. Each department keeps a daily diary and updates the attendance register regularly.

(d) Each department assures that the readings (recommended/prescribed) in their papers are available in the college library and that curriculum-related reference books are updated regularly. Similarly, laboratory equipment and tools are upgraded as per the curriculum requirements.

(e) The College has a free WiFi zone, and the state government previously gave free tablets in 2016-17 and smartphones in 2018-19.

(f) Every department also organizes special attention classes for slow learners to cope with the curriculum.

(g) Our library keeps the last five-year question papers of the University exams and provides them to the students.

(h) Decisions are made in the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) meeting for successful curriculum implementation through new books, inviting inter-faculty exchange programs, and offering better practice facilities.

(i) Students are also provided with the practical experience to augment their education.

(j) Information and Communication Technology (ICT) has also been introduced in many departments during curriculum delivery. During classroom teaching, discussion techniques are also adopted by several faculty members. Projector, Screen, online platform as google meet, zoom meeting, and other mediums are also used by the departments like Chemistry, Zoology, English, Political, Hindi, Commerce etc.

(k) All the departments conduct a regular test on the topics taught to assess the wards' performance. The departments also conduct classroom seminars, workshops, presentations, assignments etc.

(1) Field visits and outings are also organized by the Science departments and department of Geography for giving a better and more practical approach to classroom teaching.

1.1.2 The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of CIE

Response:

All affiliated colleges must follow the programs or course curriculum provided by the affiliating University. The Department of Higher Education of the State Government prepares the academic calendar for the academic session. The different colleges devise a more objective academic calendar based on their activities and interests for the entire session. The academic calendar is displayed on the notice board for students and staff. It is also uploaded on the college website for the students and stakeholders'. Monthly student-oriented assignments are listed in the academic calendar, along with the deadline for completion. Students are given homework in the science, arts and commerce stream and are actively evaluated during practicals and internal assessment. For PG programs, the affiliating University implemented an internal evaluation scheme in the 2017-18 academic year. The weightage of internal examination in PG classes are 20% of total marks, while the weightage of internal examination in UG classes is 10% of total annual examination marks. It has been implemented in UG and PG classes since 2017-18. The College creates a schedule for conducting ongoing internal assessments based on the affiliating University program.

The following are the important aspects of the institutional academic calendar.

a. Academic calendar of departmental activity.

b. Planning of multiple activities of respective committees.

c. Planning of extracurricular activities of N.S.S., Red cross society, literature and cultural departments.

d. Activities of Sports Department including prize distribution function.

e. Planning of unit tests and internal Examination by the examination cell of the College.

f.Tentative annual examination schedule of university exams.

g. University schedule of holidays and vacations, session end, and session start dates.

Students are classified as advanced learners & slow learners/ special attention classes based on various criteria. They are regularly evaluated under this method, and actions are done to improve their academic performance. Mentoring student is an effective strategy that evaluates students and enhances their learning experiences. Their learning outcomes are analyzed, and it also assists in modifying teaching strategies by assessing the students' experiences and ideas.

The Institution's only objective is to regularly evaluate the students using most of the tools and approaches described and several other measurements.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

The Institution is very conscious and awake about the issues relevant to Gender, Environment and sustainability, Human values Professional Ethics etc. Also, it follows these in the regular curriculum during teaching-learning processes of the syllabi provided by affiliating universities.

Details are given below:-

Gender - In the graduation level at B.A. and post-graduation level, different courses offer information about women empowerment, crime against women and girls, Reservation policies, constitutional provisions especially for women. The issues of gender equality and strong feminism are best portrayed in novels such as Lajja, The colour purple, Pinjar, The god of small things, and in Premchand 's Godan. A separate optional paper on Gender Studies is also prescribed in the curriculum of M.A. English.

Environment and sustainability

Environmental Studies is a compulsory paper in the first year of undergraduate courses (B.A., B.Sc., B.Com.). It covers the scope and significance of natural resources, the concept, structure, and function of an ecosystem, biodiversity and conservation, and pollution and its management. Practical assignments on environment awareness is also included.

In B.Sc. III the Botany paper deals with ecology and plant exploitation, and it provides students with ancient knowledge of herbs and the therapeutic value of plants.

Paper 1 of the BA second-year Geography course is about economic and resource geography.

The first paper in BA III is Resources and Environment, which deals with various geographical areas, ecosystem and other environmental factors. It awares wards to protect the environment and other related issues.

Human Values :

At undergraduate levels Environmental Studies and human rights are compulsory under the constitution of India. This paper covers the meaning and Protection of human rights under the UNO charter, fundamental rights and duties under the Indian constitution. Students learn about the Protection of human rights act, 1993-national human rights commission, state human rights commission and human rights court in India.

In B.A.-I the year sociology course, imparts knowledge of Indian society, its values, reformations of the community against social evils, and a social movement in tribals many more.

In B.A. I Geography, paper I is human Geography.

In B.com I, Business Communication is introduced to develop their communication skills and tact of dealing with humans.

In B.com II, Principles of Business Management deals with leadership quality and managerial skills.

Professional Ethics:

Principles that govern an individual's behaviour in the professional world are considered Professional Ethics. In commerce, professional ethics are taught with the subjects like Insurance, Fundamentals of Entrepreneurship, Accountancy, Mercantile Law, Business Environment and Business Communications.

Additionally the NSS unit of the College actively participates in the national flagship programmes and addresses cross-cutting issues at the community level. Yoga training is provided to girls and boys on international yoga day to strengthen them mentally and physically. The College organizes enough lectures on hygiene and sanitation to create awareness about girls' health. To enhance spiritual values among students, Saraswati Puja is celebrated. A career counselling program is also organised to guide and motivate the students.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

(a) The College assesses students' learning levels through class tests, homework, group discussions, class presentations, and internal exams. All faculty members implemented the techniques for students to improve their academic performance.

(b) Teachers provide an optimal learning environment with minor modifications in teaching methods based on the needs of the students. Their academic needs are assessed, and all departments provide the necessary assistance to the students.

(c) Students are divided into advanced and slow learners (special attention classes) based on various factors. Teachers and departments keep track of this information to better assist students in improving their learning abilities.

(d) To improve the abilities and capacities of slow learners, different processes are used. Teachers take extra classes to clarify concepts, dispel misconceptions, address various concerns, and explain complicated topics to improve students' performance. Teachers revise all difficult topics according to the students' needs. The ultimate goal is to upgrade their practical understanding of the courses and, as a result, they performed well in tests. It also prepares students to achieve their career-oriented aspirations.

(e) Various measures are taken for advanced learners, for setting down their ambitions. Various competitive examinations are also suggested based on their aspirations and calibre. They are guided explicitly toward higher education, such as NET /SET, research, and other national and state competitive examinations. Scientific temperament is also instilled to pursue research and development activity. Their rapid and specific success is assured, which will help them achieve success sooner and benefit the Institution's academic environment. These students are also supported in their academics by providing extra classes, revision of important areas, and so on. Mentors also conduct motivational sessions. Apart from the use of ICT, students are provided additional study materials. They are guided to other study resources, online resources of national and international level and value, and often career counselling.

(f) The teachers conduct science quizzes for advanced learners and motivate them for other competitive practice exams. This type of activity helps and encourages the students to understand the question pattern of the competitive exam such as VYAPAM PSC, SSC, Railway, Banking, etc.

(g) The department of Geography organizes field trips and field visits. These are the most successful strategies for teaching students and making them aware of geographical features, lands, plateau, rivers, soil, etc.

(h) Before beginning the courses, teachers get information from students related to their knowledge about the course and their comfort level with English and Hindi as a teaching medium. Most of the students belong to rural areas and are from Hindi medium schools.

(i) Teachers encouraged students to participate in various curricular and extracurricular activities to

improve their skills, knowledge, and capacity in their chosen subjects. Selected students from various competitions were sent to represent the College in several inter-college events in sports and other activities. On the annual day celebration, the college awards unique rewards of excellence to the students of position holders who have proved their excellence in academics, sports,co-curricular activities, literary activities, etc.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The College adopted student-centric methodologies such as experimental, participative learning, and problem-solving methods in the teaching-learning process for effective communication of the subject knowledge to the students. Faculty members of the College use various teaching methods in the learning process, including lecture, interactive (project-based learning and group discussion), ICT-enabled teaching, and experimental methods.

The College conducts the following activities to make the teaching-learning process more students centric:-

Experiential learning: -

• The institution's faculty members use ICT in the classroom and give lectures via PowerPoint presentations.

• Faculty members also provide e-books to the students. Teachers also impart educational videos effectively to make lessons more interesting and interactive.

• Educational tours and trips are organized at the departmental level to enhance the teaching-learning process and nurture and expand subject interest.

• Various departments also organize the faculty exchange programs.

Participative Learning:-

• Participative learning is used at the College to encourage students. They actively participate in various academic activities such as classroom, group discussions, class level seminars and presentations on a given topic, subject-related model preparation, poster preparation, and class level project work.

• Students gain confidence by attending a class session and participating in group discussions. They can freely and confidently express themselves.

• The students also participate in various extracurricular activities organized by the College, such as Tree Plantation, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Voter Awareness Campaign, NSS activities, etc. It makes students responsible citizens.

• Students participate in various co-curricular and academic activities, such as cultural and sporting events, to improve teaching and learning.

Problem-solving methodology:-

• To assess a student's level of subject knowledge, class tests, unit tests, and sessional/internal tests are timely conducted to maintain a competitive spirit among the students.

• Students use experiments to confirm the facts and laws of the subject in practical subjects. Students learn by doing and develop an interest in what they are studying.

• The College uses group discussion methods in several areas to encourage students to think broadly and develop opinions and ideas to test their present knowledge: soft skills, managerial communications, corporate adoptions, and other topics.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

Internal Evaluation is a critical component of any academic institution's evaluation process. The quality and quantity of internal evaluations vary according to the size of the Institution and the availability of teaching faculty.

• For undergraduate programs, all the departments of our institution conduct class tests, unit tests, class level seminars and presentations, assignments, and group discussions to assess students' performance and develop knowledge and skills.

• Since 2017-18, the College has conducted an internal evaluation examination of 10 marks for undergraduate programs, as per the regulation of Atal Bihari Vajpayee Vishwavidyalaya, Bilaspur(C.G.)

• The College conducts sessional and internal evaluation examinations, class tests, group discussions, class level seminars, and presentations for continual internal Evaluation of postgraduate programmes. The College conducts two internal assessments of 20 marks each semester, as per the rules of the Atal Bihari Vajpayee Vishwavidyalaya, Bilaspur (C.G.), beginning in 2016-17.

• Internal examination is scheduled and notified to the students well in advance.

• Faculty members prepare question papers for the internal evaluation examination.

• Once the examination is over, the faculty members evaluate answer copies, and internal evaluation marks are uploaded to the affiliated university web portal.

• The internal examination results are discussed with the students. It helps teachers and students in assessing students' learning levels and shortcomings.

• There is also the facility of resolving student grievances regarding the internal examination. The specially formed committee is responsible for resolving any related grievances. As a result, each student's academic performance is evaluated by their mentors based on their performance in the internal assessment.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, timebound and efficient

Response:

The Institute is affiliated with ABVV. The university lays down the rules and regulation process. There is complete transparency in the internal assessment evaluation.

• Internal assessment includes tests, assignments, seminars, presentations, internal exams etc. Students are also assessed by their participation in the class.

• The Institution has a special committee to look after the examination related grievances. The annual examination is conducted for all the undergraduate courses, and for Post Graduate courses, there is a provision for semester examinations.

• There are three shifts in the annual examination pattern in which examinations are conducted. The

timings of the first shift is 07.00 am to 10.00 am; the second shift is 11.00 am to 02.00 pm, and that of the third shift is 03.00 pm to 06.00 pm.

The committee gets grievances about various aspects of the examinations and promptly resolves them using a time-bound and transparent method. Depending on the nature of the complaint, it is resolved on the same day or within two or three days at the most. Generally, these complaints are about the sitting facilities and the availability of drinking water in every classroom, even after a full-fledged arrangement of all necessary amenities during exam time. The Institution is acutely aware of these issues and focuses on any such complaints, ensuring promptly and satisfactorily addressed.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Programme and course outcomes for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students.

Response:

Our College is affiliated with Atal Bihari Vajpayee University, Bilaspur. We offer undergraduate as well as postgraduate programs under the Faculty of Arts (UG and PG), Commerce (UG), and Science (UG). The admission is based on the previous qualifying examination for degree courses like B.A, B.Com, B.Sc and M.A. After getting the admissions, the students were made aware of the courses prescribed for the degree. We have seven subjects in B.A., five subjects in Science and two subjects in P.G. classes.

The College maintains a website where it publishes information about its programs. Students are informed about program outcomes, program-specific outcomes, and course outcomes. Every academic session, a college prospectus is published, containing all admission-related information, such as the admission process, cost structure, and programs and courses provided by the Institution. Teachers from all departments explain the program and course outcomes to students in the classroom at the start of the session. The syllabus, given to the students, specifies the course outcomes.

Following are some program and course outcomes of the College:-

• B.A./M.A. (Political Science):- It assists in demonstrating the ability to express and defend a political vision in areas like justice, democracy, community, and freedom. It helps in the understanding of various countries' laws and policies.

• B.A.(Sociology): This course teaches students how to critically consider the causes and implications of social inequality and how to conduct and evaluate empirical sociological research.

• B.A./M.A. (English), English Foundation and Literature:- This curriculum helps students improve their writing, reading, listening, and speaking skills. . To impart knowledge of English Language and English Literature, students must read, analyze, interpret, and create text. To enable the students to

transform their understanding of English in their day-to-day life.

• B.A. Geography:- Understand the structure of different parts of the earth and apply Geomorphology.

• Hindi Foundation and Literature:- It helps in the formation of students' personality, language, national spirit, culture, social mobility, unity, and integrity.

• B.Com. (Commerce):- This programme could provide knowledge about Industries, Banking, Insurance, Financing, etc. Students can independently start up their businesses.

• B.Sc. (Zoology):- Students gain knowledge and skills in animal science basics and understand the complex interconnections among living organisms.

• B.Sc. (Botany):- Students will identify and classify the major plant categories and compare and evaluate plant traits. Students will receive scientific knowledge in the subject of Life Sciences and basic plant processes.

• B.Sc. (Chemistry):- This programme helps students in understanding chemical behaviour and physical properties of common substances, as well as describing solid, liquid, and gas characteristics.

• B.Sc. (Physics):- It helps the student know about fundamental laws of gravitational force, electromagnetic wave theory, interference, reflection, refraction, polarization etc. Students will be able to analyze and solve the numeric problems related to the basic concept of physics.

• B.Sc. Maths:- Provide The Basic Knowledge Of Maths, Understand Different Problem Of Maths, Helps The Study in Higher Education, Use In Banking and Railway Areas, Use In Engineering and Medical field.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

The probable outcomes are specified in various disciplines, and it is for the departments to ensure that the outcomes are achieved after every examination. Any institution's students' performance and teaching-learning methodologies get a litmus test through such performance analysis.

The College evaluated programme and course outcomes through the strength of the student. Every year many students apply for admission against the sanctioned seat of UG and PG programmes. Every main annual and semester examination shows the students' performance through passing percentages. That is increasing progressively in the last five years. Students' learning/course outcomes are assessed regularly through class tests, seminars, quizzes, presentations, field surveys, and projects. Continuous Evaluation

A sports committee is constituted to guide the department of sports in various areas. The state government's Public Works Department maintains physical and academic facilities. The institution is responsible for maintaining other support facilities such as a laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, and classrooms.

Our College's nonacademic class IV staff are utilized for maintaining cleanliness in and around the college premises. We maintain a garden inside the college premises. The facilities like a computer with internet connection are also installed in Principal room, library, and other departments. Local skilled labourers outsource electrical and plumbing-related maintenance, and the college budget is met.

Students in the final stage of degree and PG courses need to be prepared for competitive exams. Keeping this in view, a competitive exam cell is established in our College. The cell supports exams like PSC and VYAPAM. The students are motivated to improve their intellectual quotient [IQ Level] and general

knowledge and be abreast with current affairs. This facility is provided to the students free of cost as a goodwill gesture.

Different committees are formed, and a professor in charge/convenor is appointed to supervise the upkeep of the garden, green campus, furniture, PWD works, RO water facility maintenance, internet, and wi-fi facilities, CTV, cycle stand, printing service, and parking zone, among other things. 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The Institution is administered by the department of higher education, Govt. of Chhattisgarh. It is managed by the state government's rules and regulations. The state government offers various welfare benefits and programs for teaching and non-teaching staff: Official clothes for fourth class employees and festival advances are provided. All teaching and non-teaching staff are provided with a three-month temporary part final from GPF, limited to Rs. 90,000 as per Chhattisgarh state government laws. After retirement, the employee receives a gratuity and leave encashment. Medical reimbursement is available as per state government regulations. Pension benefits are available to teachers appointed before 2004. Those appointed after 2004 are eligible for NPS benefits. Leave and financial help are provided by state governments/UGC/DST/CGCOST/CSIR and other government bodies for attending national/international seminars/conferences. GPF loans are also available to those who have completed 15 years of service to marry their children, acquire a car, build a house, or repay other bank debts. Allowance for travel and commodities is permitted in the event of an administrative transfer. Maternity leave, paternity leave, and child care leave are also provided following government regulations. Teachers are granted leave to pursue further education on a wage basis by government regulations.

The teaching and non-teaching staff are granted different leaves such as casual leave, earned leave, medical leave, etc. To update the subject knowledge, the teaching staff members are allowed to participate in the orientation programme, refresher program, and short-term courses as they need as given per the rules of UGC norms. Provisions of Child care/maternity leave are granted to the regular women staff as per state govt. rules.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The funding agency for the institution is the State government, RUSA & Jan Bhagidari. The infrastructural and other requirements of the institution are met through the funding of the state govt. The granted funds under Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan, i.e., RUSA scheme, have been utilized for academic support programs.

Salary component- The government pays the salary of the regular teaching and non-teaching staff. Govt. of Chhattisgarh also orders every year to appoint the guest lecturers against vacant posts of Asst. Professors and Professor at the beginning of the Academic session on fixed wages.

Amalgamated fund- Fees collected from the students as the amalgamated fund is utilized in various studentcentric activities like sports activities, annual cultural activities, magazines and Periodicals in the library, security measures, i.e., installation of CCTV cameras.

Amalgamated funds are utilized according to the Govt. finance code.

The scholarships for students received from the state government are directly credited to the account of the students. The budget for each academic year is prepared by the College and grants received from RUSA and State Government under the College Development Scheme. The College fully utilizes the grants for the purpose it is being sanctioned.

Payments to laboratory equipment suppliers are made only after the items have been verified through the proper channels and the condition of the goods has been established. After verifying that the bills meet the specified standards, they are accepted for payment. Payments to book suppliers are paid only after the books have been approved by the Heads of Departments by the lists similarly provided by them. Upgrades to the library by giving current advances in various areas result in unique learning methods, and as a result, necessary funds are spent from time to time. The Principal is ultimately responsible for bill payment.

Most payments are made by cheques, bank drafts, and electronic cash transfers like RTGS and NEFT.

The concerned departments retain a record of each transaction in the Stock Registers.

The funds raised by Janbhagidari Samiti benefit students and college welfare.

Additionally, examination money is judiciously spent.

Procurement Process:

Quotations are obtained from at least three different suppliers to find out the competitive prices, and the Purchase Committee approves the lowest price.

The grants are allocated to all the departments as per their demands.

Purchase Rules of the State Government are followed.

The Principal monitors and controls the financial procedures.

The construction of the building and other structures, their repair and whitewash, etc., is done by PWD by following the government norms under the supervision of the Principal. The PWD does the development and maintenance of the infrastructure. In contrast, the minor repairs and issues are taken up by the different departments or by the Building Committee of the College.

Response:

Best practice - 1

1. Title of the practice: "Go Green"

2. Objective of the practice: To create environment consciousness, Maintain biodiversity, Tree plantation

3. The context:

The main challenge of the modern world is biodegradation and the adversities of climate change. The lack of awareness amongst students and the general public about the challenging situation facing the world consequent upon fast-changing climate and abuse of nature. There is a need to educate students community about the existence of challenges climate change and its adverse effect on the community and human life, at present and in future. The Eco-friendly campus will give a message to the students that if nature is protected, the adversities of climate can be avoided. The green atmosphere in the campus creates a suitable learning environment and also gives lessons regarding how to protect the environment and help the human race. Apart from mankind, the other species also need the protection of the environment. Life can be better and more enjoyable if green practices are followed.

4. Practice: Plantation -

more than 300 plants were planted in the campus initially but due to geomorphological characteristics of the region (Red laterite soil) with the least moisture-retaining property, the growth of the plant and their life expectancy is variable. A few of them are cited below.

Ficus religiosa, Ficus bengalensis, Delonix regia, Syzygium cumini, Alstonia etc.

Energy conservation

·Awareness has been created among staff and students to save energy. Incandescent bulbs are replaced with compact fluorescent lamps.·Lights, fans, computers and laptops are switched on only when required.·Lights are not turned on in rooms and labs where natural light is sufficient. The building of the

college is planned and constructed in such a way that there is sufficient Sunlight and ventilation.

Water Harvesting-

Rainwater harvesting is implemented for the college Campus. Storage pond is created for recharge of groundwater. Rainwater harvesting is established for the entire campus through the development of a drainage network and recharge pit adjacent to the drainage network. About 50% of the runoff generated is used in recharging the ground through the pond.

5. Evidence of success: Most of the planted trees are living and growing with a good rate of growth.

7. Problem encountered:

Going green means pursuing ways that can lead to more environmentally friendly and ecologically responsible decisions and lifestyles, thereby helping to protect the environment and sustain its natural resources for current as well as future generations. However, there may arise some problems: Lack of awareness among the students ·Poor availability of eco-friendly products wrong understanding about organic product Difficulties in implementing Water conservation projects. Mismanagement of garbage. ·Poor waste management Inadequate financial resources.

1. Title of the Practice

To distribute sanitary pads to female students of the college.

2. Objectives of the Practice

To create awareness about menstrual practices and menstrual hygiene management among female students of the college so as to avoid reproductive tract infection moreover, it will lead to the availability of sanitary pads to the students who can not afford such products due to high cost.

3. The Context

Menstrual flow comprises mucus and vaginal secretion along with blood which might have an unpleasant odour and other sources of infections. Neglecting or compromising menstrual hygiene may lead to gynaecological problems hence the college found it utmost necessary to dispense sanitary pads at an affordable price to the female students of the college () as and when needed. Menstrual flow has been seen as dirty polluting and shameful and therefore from time unknown women hide menstrual clothes for fear of being crushed and other social causes. Being in a rural area, there is a lack of awareness to use fresh and hygienic-sanitary pads for this purpose. Thus, to provide better feminine hygiene college passed a resolution from the Jan bhagidari committee to purchase a sanitary pad vending machine along with the disposing machine.

4. The Practice

Describe the practice and its uniqueness in the context of Indian higher education. What were the constraints/limitations, if any, faced(in about400words)?

The women's cell of the college considered it as an utmost necessary step to provide hygienic sanitary pads

to girl students of the college. Due to a lack of health awareness, hygiene and sanitation the majority of the girl student used cloth during their menstrual period. : Menstruation is normal and a healthy part of life and yet girls and women in India go through extreme struggles to manage their period every month. A large chunk of the Indian population believes this natural cycle to be a 'curse', 'impure' and 'dirty' among other things, courtesy of the ancient myths surrounding menstruation in our country. According to Census 2011 population data, about 336 million girls and women in India are of reproductive age and menstruate for 2-7 days, every month, and yet the topic of menstruation is expected to be a hush affair and kept under wraps by the 'black plastic bags', which is given to most of us each time we buy sanitary napkins. When a girl faces challenges in managing her period in a healthy manner, it can cause a number of problems to her physical as well as mental health. Not only will she be at risk of infection, but her education, self-esteem, and confidence also suffer in a major way. Hence Women Cell started distributing the pads since 2017 by voluntary contributing and procuring the sanitary pads. A register has been maintained in the department of English. Whenever a girl student needs in an emergency a pad she has been offered the same.

5. Evidence of Success

Provide evidence of success such as performance against targets and benchmarks, review/results. What do these results indicate? Describe in about 200 words.

In rural areas, girl students normally do not have access to sanitary products or they know very little about the types and methods of using them or are unable to afford such products due to high cost. So, they mostly rely on reusable cloth pads which they wash and use again. The women cell observed that the girl students due to lack of awareness and unhygienic approach used to throw the cloth soiled with the menstrual fluid in the bathroom/washroom, which imposed a high degree of biohazard health-related problems to others. Now as the college procured a sanitary pad vending machine along with the incinerator. It provides means for instant disposal of used Napkins in a very scientific and hygienic way. It has a top opening Door for easy operation and is convenient to install inside the toilet. The ash is collected in an Ash Collection tray at the bottom of the Incinerator. Thus it is designed for girls to operate very easily and safely. Complete burning of napkins only less than 5% ash per Napkin is generated. The girl students now have easy access to the pads at economical rates. The choking of the toilet seats due to cloth has been eradicated now which is a great success in the implementation of the scheme.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Due to the lack of menstrual hygiene management facilities, including the availability of sanitary napkins and awareness about menstruation, the girl students usually miss up to 5 days of college every month. Hence the women's cell came forward for this and started providing sanitary pads at their own expense. Later on, with the funds of YRC large economical commercial packs of pads were purchased. Subsequently, looking at the need and importance of the practice, the Principal and the Women Cell decided to put it before the Janbhagidhari committee. A meeting was called and the budget amounting to nearly 27000 INR for procuring dispensing machines along with incineration was passed with the majority.
